Controversy in Art

Continuing on with the theme controversy in art I'm now writing about how art is used as a political tool and as a way to get a message across!

Although it is now 35 years ago in 1989 a group of artists named "<u>The Guerilla Girls</u>" asked the question:

"Do you have to be naked to get into the Met. Museum?"

These girls were a group of feminist activist artists, who use fact, humour, and outrageous visuals to expose gender, ethnic bias and corruption in politics, art, film, and pop culture. They designed a billboard aimed at criticizing museums for underrepresenting female artists and objectifying women. The Public Art Fund rejected the piece deeming it too provocative, so they rented spaces on NY buses and ran the billboard themselves.



Ai Weiwei, dropping a Han Dynasty Urn in 1995 it was called an act of desecration to which he replied

"General Maio used to tell us we can only build a new world if we destroy the old one."

Ai Weiwei is one of the greatest provocateurs of our time. His work heavily criticises the Chinese government and he fights for freedom of expression. The image depicts Ai Weiwei -as he smashes a 200-year-old ceremonial urn of significant symbolic and cultural worth. He was prevented from leaving China for many years but now lives in Portugal.







Damien Hirst

One of the most controversial figures in art today. Preserved dead animals sell for as much as £100,000 he is one of the highest paid artists of all time and one of the most heavily criticised.

"For the Love of God" is a platinum cast of a human skull encrusted with 8,601 diamonds. This artwork sold for the highest price ever paid for a work by a living artist, £50 million. It cost £14 million to produce. The artwork is supposed to question the morality of art and money.




All these works are points of contention, seeking justice or trying to get a point across.

ARTISTS PROFILE

Christine Jones

I have been creative for as long as I can remember, always trying a new art or craft. F or the past 20 years it has been textiles, in particular knitting and weaving.



Knitting has seen me travel overseas to attend workshops in France and conferences in New York, where one of my knitted dresses walked the runway as a finalist in an international knitwear design competition. I knit every day and enjoy occasional freelance design work.

More recently I have been creating woven items on a Japanese Saori loom. Saori embraces the philosophy that each woven creation is a unique reflection of the weaver's inner self and emotions. Unlike traditional weaving methods that adhere to strict patterns and uniformity, Saori encourages freedom of expression and experimentation.

I find it a meditative process and the end results are both functional and decorative. I enjoy making the cloth and then transforming it into individual pieces of clothing.

I joined BACCI earlier this year. It is wonderful to be part of a supportive like-minded group of artists, and I have been able to exhibit my weaving and share my love of Saori weaving.

Featured artist(s) for October are:


1. Karyn Fendley (for the 1st 2 weeks)

Karyn Fendley is a contemporary landscape artist based in Mullumbimby. Her landscape paintings, with their bright skies, deep shadows, and silhouettes, capture the essence of the Australian landscape.



Karyn was raised in Brisbane and studied at Queensland College of Art. Since relocating to the north coast of New South Wales, she has held regular solo exhibitions and exhibited in many group exhibitions and competitions. Her artworks are housed in public and private collections worldwide.

Karyn's artwork investigates how we remember places we have visited and how to capture the essence of those locations with simple imagery. After spending time in the field, she returns to the studio to paint, blending memory and observation to capture the atmosphere of the place that inspires the work, rather than detailing any specific view. Dramatic composition, extremes of lightness and darkness, and flattened perspectives are hallmarks of her painting practice.


That special present for your loved one, and much more is offered, we want to add to the Christmas joy in our community.

From Rosie, the recent culture vulture

During September and October we spent three weeks in Sydney and got to do so much.

We visited our first exhibition of Czech painter Alphonse Mucha – *the king of Art Nouveau*, (we went in the evening ... it was PACKED!)

I came away genuinely believing he was a genius with the most unbelievable work ethic. Room after room after room of beautiful work. Most of it printed lithographs.







Alphonse Mucha considered himself much more than an Art Nouveau artist, he believed in himself, and proved that he was a serious artist. Between 1910 and 1928 he created 20 huge canvases, the largest 6m x 8m is about the history of the Balkans. These canvases depict the mythology and history of Czechs and other Slavic peoples.

The next day was The Australian Museum where were we saw the Australian Geographic Nature Photographer of the Year exhibition (2023) – stunning!. The overall winner was Scott Portelli, (unfortunately no picture available).

The day after was The Wildlife Photographer of the year (2023) at the Maritime Museum. Another stunning show and beautifully presented. Good museum and worth a visit, although couldn't handle walking through the submarine! (no picture available here either).

Then on the weekend we walked to White Bay, which was walking distance from my brother's where we were staying. White Bay was first opened to the public in 2023 for the Biennale of Sydney. Another mind blowing place, it's an old power station that is being renovated/restored for public use. There was also a lot of local artists displaying their work, just on open mesh, in my opinion our display is sooo much better.

There were also some craft people, (and a terrific ice cream truck!)

Below are 2 pictures of some of the art display set up + 2 of the Power Station itself.









We went back to the Art Gallery of NSW to see the *Infinite Dobell Australian Drawing Biennial 2024,* it was a bit too 3D for my taste. But on the way we lucked into an amazing, self-funded, exhibition by www.marijkegreenway.com

Marijke is also amazingly prolific, she has been just about everywhere in Australia and has painted it, see below.







I visited to the Australian design Centre to see the Fuse Glass prize.

The winner? *The Funny Little Lion*. I thought there was more interesting and original work on show.


