I was reading an article in which people were saying they are going to sell their Tesla cars, and many others have decided to go with other brands. Their reasoning being they don't like Elon Musk. It got me thinking about the "bad boys in art" and the question of should we exhibit the art by bad people?

It's a very tricky question, should we, and can we, separate the art from the person?

Egon Schiele (1890-1918)

I'm not afraid to admit he's one of my favourite artists. In 1912, Schiele and his (then partner) Wally Neuzil moved to Neulengbach, attempting to find new inspiration away from Vienna. While the respectable citizens of the town avoided Schiele, local children from poor families were fascinated by the artist. Schiele sometimes paid teenage girls to pose for him, to the great outrage of their families who believed that modelling was a synonym for sex work.

After an incident involving one of Schiele's models, he was imprisoned for a month and forced to leave Neulengbach. The girl asked Schiele and Neuzil to take her to Vienna to live with her grandmother instead of her parents. Soon after arriving in the capital, the teenager got sick, and the trio returned to Neulengbach. By then, the girl's father had already filed a report of rape and kidnapping, accusing the artist. While no proof of sexual misconduct was found, the town authorities still convicted Schiele for *public immorality* and for demonstrating his art in locations accessible to minors. He spent 24 days in jail. He still managed to create a sculpture of bread and spit.

Schiele died from Spanish flu at the age of 28, after nursing his young pregnant wife.

He produced work of great beauty and great power, and I wonder what he would have produced if he had lived longer.

His work is now revered, and galleries fight over ownership, but he was once labelled evil and contemptuous.

Next month I'll write about another bad boy Pablo Picasso.

A POTTED HISTORY OF BACCI

In February 1998 Grace Cruice put a tiny ad in the then Ballina Advocate. Just one column wide, three centimetres high in a black box. "Anyone interested in an Art Gallery for Ballina phone Grace (with her number). Twelve people answered & the Dream began!

A Public Meeting was held on the 22 May under the umbrella of the Ballina Arts Society. An inaugural meeting in August formed BACCI & by March 1999 we were incorporated as Ballina Arts & Craft Centre Inc.

The next seven years were spent fund-raising with an Annual Exhibition at the RSL, Street Stalls, raffles, stalls in Shopping Centres & selling Bricks which raised \$4,500.

We applied for grants & Government funding & in the end had raised \$577,500. By 2004 four proposed sites were overruled by Council even with the then Committee of four turning the 'first sod', unknown by most members, at Treelands Reserve. Then the Council determined that it be the site for the Community Services Centre.

We lost Grace in 2005 but kept going with her dream.

In 2006 we applied to Council to use the Old Council Chambers in Cherry Street. When accepted the Council matched our funds with a further \$500,000. Restoration commenced in May & on October BACCI held its first Exhibition in the new gallery.

Unfortunately, that was the beginning of the end. The then Committee had its own agenda to be paid to manage the gallery. So we were out. They formed a volunteer group Friends of the Gallery to work it. Council knocked back their proposal & hired a paid Curator.

In 2008, BACCI as you know it today was reformed. Centre less, cash less, but ready to move on. Two Exhibitions a year, bus trips, workshops, social get togethers and no fundraising! But each Exhibition caters for a Charity. A wonderful group of people who support each other.

In 2010, Lesley Ryan, Secretary & myself made a deputation to Council on the 22 July, for our One Free Exhibition each year in the Gallery. Lesley couldn't be there, but Edna Moss came with me. Scary, but we had a win. June 2011 saw our first 'Grace Cruice Memorial Exhibition for two weeks begin. Now two months long & our 14th Year.

BACCI Membership has fluctuated over the years from 120 to the present 63. The sad loss of a lot of our original members, & others moving on. We meet the first Tuesday of each month at the Cherry Street Sports club for social catch up at 5pm, meeting at 5.30pm. As well as the annual Grace Cruice Memorial Exhibition we hold two other Exhibitions for our members at the Masonic Hall, Cherry Street, (since 2018). We have wonderful, informative, Monthly Newsletters & New Members are always made welcome.

We thank all of you who have been here for the long haul & have worked so hard to keep us strong, & a big welcome to all our newer members. The hard work is done but we need you all to step up & help keep our 'Big Adventure' going forward.

On behalf of BACCI & Grace's Dream I would like to thank you.

1. Stedroy Farrell

Stedroy's unique artworks are created using timber objects with the idea of helping the environment.

He has always had an affinity to timber, enjoying the medium since he was a boy. He was to find endless inspiration in the diversity of shape and texture each piece offered and was led to make his first guitar as a teenager.

With retirement looming, Stedroy seized the opportunity to dedicate his time to his childhood passion.

'As a retired software engineer, the thought of retirement without a plan worried me' said Stedroy. 'So, several years prior, my wife and I planned where we would live and what I would do with my time' ... hence my workshop was born.

Here I spend my days creating objects from salvaged timber. I let the wood talk to me to determine the article I will create. It might be a box, a chopping board, a chess set or a lamp stand. Even odd pallets can become vertical gardens... 'waste not, want not is my mantra.'






Rod's background is in sign-writing and graphic artist, working and living in Melbourne and then WA, before finally moving to Ballina in the 1980's.

Relying on his skills from the last 40 years, bringing colour and composition into his work, he has progressed into the arts.

'I have no favourite subject or style, I just paint what I like, usually in acrylics. You could say I have had a paintbrush in my hand most of my life

However, having started painting at an older age brings its own doubts and confidence issues. I decided that if I am going to fail, I might as well do it in spectacular form, so I picked the hardest subject I could and painted it in oil. The reason being, that even if I could, maybe, make it look like some form of art, I might have a chance.'
